School Committee Meeting

In case you missed Monday night's school committee meeting, here are some highlights:

- Cashman SEL Learning Presentation: Students and staff from CES presented to the school committee about the Social Emotional Learning (SEL) work they have been engaged in during this school year. In particular, the students highlighted some of the programs and activities that support SEL development, including learning yoga and meditation techniques. The students even demonstrated one of their yoga breathing techniques and the school committee members participated right along with them. One school committee member even commented that the committee could certainly benefit from practicing breathing and relaxation prior to the regular meetings!
- Lyn Jacques, Director of Teaching and Learning, provided an update of the work occurring through the curriculum office. She described the curriculum development work that the teachers across the district were completing, which actually dovetailed very well with the presentation from the Cashman students and staff. She also discussed the professional development opportunities that were provided this year for staff members. Additionally, she described briefly about the coordinate program review process that the district will be involved in this year and next year. Ms. Jacques is coordinating the civil rights portion of the review. This year, we are gathering documents to support our compliance with a series of indicators in special education, English language learning, and civil rights. Next spring, the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Special Education will conduct a site visit where they will interview staff, parents, and community members; observe in classrooms; and identify the ways in which the documentation we provided is supported by interviews and classroom visits. In essence, they want to ensure that we have policies and procedures in place that comply with state and federal regulations and that staff members are aware of these policies and implement them with fidelity in the classrooms and schools. I will continue to update the community about this process as more information becomes available.
- New Policy: JJ Co-Curricular and Extra-Curricular Activities The school committee approved a new
 policy around the ways in which we hire, evaluate, and retain advisors for our extra-curricular
 programs. This policy will help to improve transparency about the process.
- The school committee also officially voted on the last day of school for the 2016-2017 school year. The last day for our students and paraprofessionals will be June 22 and the last day for teachers will be June 23. The student's last day will be a half day with the following dismissal times:
 - Elementary Schools 11:30
 - Middle School 10:50
 - High School 10:50
- AEFI Grant acceptance We are so fortunate to have the support of the Amesbury Education Foundation, Inc. (AEFI) in our community. Each year, AEFI provides our staff with a number of grants. These grants provide our staff with the opportunity to explore new and innovative educational opportunities, which might otherwise not be funded through the regular budget. Some are awarded at


Soar to the Top
