What is Lightning and Thunder?

Lightning is very exciting! What is lightning and thunder? I'm going to tell you what lightning and thunder are.

There are about 16 million thunderstorms each year in the world. Thunderstorms are when moist air near the Earth is heated by the sun. Most are made of several cells in a row. This is called the squall line. They last 15 to 20 minutes and then new cells are made. This can go on for hours. Lightning forms when clouds become charged and when the



voltage is high enough. Thunder is the sound of the lightning when it superheats the air. Lightning can strike anywhere, even the same place! Lightning can make a big strike noise. You can hear lightning because it makes a really loud sound. Lightning is a giant spark of electricity in the atmosphere between clouds, the air, or the ground. In the early stages of storm development, air acts as an insulator between the positive and negative charges in the cloud and between the cloud and the ground. When those charges become strong enough, the clouds discharge the energy in the form of a lightning bolt.

- Lightning strikes usually happen every second on earth.
- There are millions of volts of electricity in lightning.
- The average temperature of lightning is 36,000 F.
- Lightning seeks the shortest path to the ground.
- Lightning Safety:
 - Never go under a tree.
 - Don't swim during lightning storms.
 - Find shelter. This includes your house.
 - Avoid open areas like parks and playgrounds, ponds, lakes and beaches.

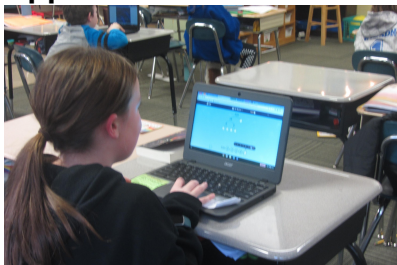

What is the Difference between OT and PT?

Have you ever wondered what the difference is between occupational therapy and physical therapy? My mom is a physical therapist and I didn't know the difference. I got to talk to the OT and PT that work at our school and they helped me figure it out. Miss Robin is our OT and Miss Melinda is our PT.

Miss Robin said that Occupation means how people spend their time. Occupation for adults means their work. For kids, occupation means playing and school. Miss Melinda said that PT is a little different in schools than other places. In schools, it is the treatment of physical difficulties through exercise, stretching, and sometimes using equipment.

So who needs OT and PT? Miss Robin said any students who lack skills that are interfering in their daily life may need OT. Miss Melinda said that anyone who needs help moving around their school or participating in school activities might need PT. All types of kids might need OT or PT.

I asked Miss Melinda, "Was it hard to become a physical therapist?" She said, "Yes. It's a lot of school. You have to go to college and then get your doctorate degree. A doctorate degree for PT is about two more years of school after college." And I asked Miss Robin how long it takes you to study OT. She said, "So when I went to school it was 4 years, but now it is 6 years."

What do kids do in OT or PT? Miss Melinda said, "In a school, we help students participate in their curriculum and access their school environment. That could mean walking in the halls, playing at recess, or even sitting in a chair." Miss Robin said, "They come to OT if their skills are interfering in daily life."

It all comes down to the final question: what is the difference between OT and PT? PT works on bigger muscles, muscles that help you move around. OT works on smaller muscles, usually muscles that help you write and type and even eat. Miss Robin said, "We both do the same things, but we look at the problem in different ways." I think Mr. M said it best, "I love OT and PT. We are very lucky. I think Miss. Robin is outstanding. I think Mrs. Hart is outstanding. Miss Robin and Mrs. Hart together are a phenomenal team." The difference doesn't really matter, They are here to help students succeed.

Who was George McNeill?

George McNeill was born on 8/4/1836 in Amesbury and he died on 5/17/1906 (he was 69 years old). We remember him because he made it so kids can go to school without being rich because he lived in a time when rich kids went to school and poor kids had to work in a Mill. Beginning in 1847, ten-year-old George McNeill had to work at a textile mill from 5:00 in the morning to 7:00 at night and never got to go to school. Mills were dangerous places for kids and adults, but he had no choice. It was an awful place to work, so one day the spinners, weavers, and workers in the carding room went on strike. Despite both Amesbury and Salisbury supporting the workers, and striking workers trying to negotiate with Derby, the

mill owners brought in police guards and hired 50 Irish immigrants (immigrants are people who come to live permanently in a different country) to take the place of the original workers to operate the machinery. The strikers never won their demands; they did not get their jobs back. While you might think that the Derby Strike was a failure, it did inspire young George McNeill. For the rest of his life he fought for both the universal education of children and for labor fairness in Massachusetts.

At AES, the George McNeill award is the highest award we present, given each year to two students who have demonstrated their leadership during their time at Amesbury Elementary School.

I knew that Mrs. Ripley had been a teacher here at AES for a while, but I also wondered if she had ever taught at any other school. She said she had worked at the Parthum Elementary School in Lawrence working with grades first through fourth on reading.

I always enjoy cleaning out!” she answered. “This is a great opportunity to go through what I use and do not need anymore. Code and circuit is non-profit educational coding studio located at 36 Main St, Amesbury, MA. Ken Aspeslagh started Code and Circuit in 2013, as a fun side project. He is a computer programmer, who worked with Apple at one time, but now owns his own company with his brother. Ken’s inspiration for Code and Circuit was actually Mr. McBrien, who is the computer teacher at AES. At the time, Mr. McBrien was running a morning computer club, which was a group of students who would come in early to help with computer lab tasks. Ken said “I can’t remember whose idea it was, but I came in as a guest a few times and gave some small computer science lessons. It was so fun to do and meet all the kids that I had the idea to start my own classroom.”



When I asked him why he was interested in teaching coding, he said "I think it's really crazy that most people use computers all day, but nobody knows how they really work." Ken wanted to teach people how they work, and also provide mentorship and knowledge to kids who are interested in becoming engineers and computer programmers.

After working with Mr. McBrien in his lab, Ken researched similar organizations and things that already existed, and decided there wasn't really anything quite like what he wanted to create, at least not in the area.

Then, Ken made a list of people he knew who he thought could be involved in teaching classes, and volunteer, and he talked to each of them about it.

He rented the room on Main St here for the classroom, he bought 8 MacBook Airs and 8 iPads, a TV, a big white board, some desks and chairs, and other things and made the website. Then, Ken came up with a few class ideas. For his first classes, it was mostly friends and people he knew already.

Then, he had to learn about teaching, and build experiences about running a classroom and communicating with students and parents.

In 2018, Ken decided to incorporate the business as a non-profit. This means that money he earns from people signing up for classes, and any donations and grants he receives all goes back into running the classroom.

His wife helped him come up with the name Code & Circuit. They brainstormed name ideas, and that was the one that they liked the best. A lot of businesses back then were starting to be named like This & That, like Crate & Barrel, etc. And that's the history of Code & Circuit.

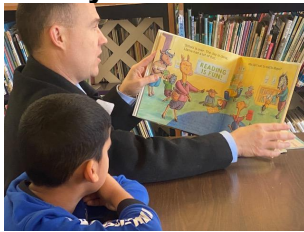
thought that she was the right person for the job. She loves teaching students about art and helping them to learn how to express themselves artistically. That is the Mrs. Ramos' story for you.
